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Messages

From Our Global Leadership

2021 was a year of great challenges for children. COVID-19 rolled back years of progress on the advancement of children's rights, especially those of girls. School closures pushed more children into poverty, child labour, early marriage and pregnancy, and widened the learning gap. The pandemic and other conflicts increased the incidence of mental health challenges in children and displaced more families from their homes.

We knew that a crisis of this scale meant that we must fight even harder to uphold the right every child has to a quality education and the hope of a better future.

Early in the year, we launched our 2021-25 strategic plan, charting an ambitious course that will see us lay the foundation to empower 100 million children by 2030 with the education, skills, and opportunities they need to rise above adversity and create a more peaceful and equitable world. Our POWER video resource provided 100 Right To Play games to teachers, coaches, and caregivers for the first time through an open-source platform. It is just one of the ways we are innovating to share 20 years of learning and expertise with an increasing number of children and organizations.

Throughout the year, when we spoke with our staff, junior leaders, coaches and community partners, we were constantly impressed by their creativity and commitment to making things happen for children. Our teams were full of new ideas about how we could lead the way in promoting children's development even in the face of escalating and intersecting crises. In 2021, we collaborated on five studies with academic partners to examine how we can continue to evolve programs to meet children's changing needs using new approaches, technology, and tools.

Results from education programs in Ghana showed 89% of girls were demonstrating leadership in their classes, up from 74% at the start of the program. Results from programs in Mali showed 36.5% of girls who were working in mines are now back in school or safer kinds of work. We also focused on impact at the governance level, building strength in our international and national advisory boards that will help us become an ever more innovative and effective organization sharing powerful learnings and best practices across geographies and cultures.

All of this work was only possible thanks to supporters like you. Thank you for standing by the world's most vulnerable children during an extremely challenging year. We are proud and grateful to have you by our side as we continue to empower children to claim their right to a brighter future.

From Our Dutch Leadership

The worldwide spread of COVID-19 and its far-reaching consequences also had an impact on Right To Play in the Netherlands. We had to navigate in an environment where the possibilities to raise funds for our work with vulnerable children was very limited. The Right To Play Gala - planned right after the Summer Olympic Games - could not take place and the Dam tot Damloop, of which Right To Play Netherlands is the official charity, was canceled. Fortunately, we were able to organize a successful Sports Quiz, continued to work with our long time partners, and started to collaborate with a number of field hockey clubs.

We were also able to raise awareness about the importance of play-based learning for the cognitive development of children worldwide through a wellattended webinar with neuropsychology professor Erik Scherder, We launched the Save Her Seat campaign, which aims to get 11 million girls who are at risk of not returning to school due to worldwide lockdowns back into school.

The position of girls was also a topic of conversation in our new podcast series Talking About Impact, in which sports journalist and Right To Play Ambassador Rivkah op het Veld speaks to fellow ambassadors about challenging issues that have an impact on the healthy development of children worldwide.

At the end of 2021 Wilco Jiskoot passed on the chair's baton to Mickey Hovers, who is chairing the Board from January 2022 onwards. We are very grateful for everything Wilco has done and contributed to the organization, helping us to protect, educate and empower children worldwide to rise above adversity using the power of play.

OUR MISSION

We play for change in four key areas:

QUALITY EDUCATION

In Ghana, 73% of girls in Right To Play-supported schools **are reading better and faster since the start of programs**, compared to 60% of girls in unsupported schools.

GIRLS' EMPOWERMENT

In Pakistan, the number of girls in a Right To Play program who reported experiencing **corporal punishment dropped** from 67% at the start to 36% by the end.

HEALTH & WELL-BEING

In Uganda, 97% of children showed life skills like **independence**, **confidence**, **and a positive sense of identity**, up from 76% at the project's start.

CHILD PROTECTION

In Mali, the number of children reporting **child labour in their community dropped** from 83% at the start of the program to 35% at the end.







TINKERING AND CODING

Learning about tinkering, coding, and robotics is empowering Rwandan children to think critically, express their creativity, and build their leadership and teamwork skills. In 2021, Right To Play launched the Plug In Play program, an innovative new program that is supporting children to learn basic principles of technology (coding, tinkering, and making) through playful lessons. In partnership with the LEGO Foundation, we're working with the Rwandan Ministry of Education to integrate playful learning into the science curriculum and train teachers on how to support students to engage in hands-on learning in the classroom.

DATA-DRIVEN EMOTIONAL LEARNING

Social and emotional life skills are crucial for children's healthy development, helping them to advocate for themselves, cope with negative experiences, and forge stronger relationships with other people. In collaboration with the universities of Notre Dame and Dar es Salaam, we are pioneering a new tool that will measure how children develop context-appropriate

social and emotional learning skills. With the rich new data collected by this testing, we will be able to more easily and rapidly identify the most effective methods of strengthening children's holistic life skills across different programs and share those lessons where they can make the greatest differences for children.

PARTNERING FOR SCALE

We want to reach more children than ever before with the opportunity for active, experiential learning. Creating enduring and sustainable changes in children's classroom experiences on a national scale means partnering with governments to strengthen teachers' skills and support. In 2021, we continued to support the ministries of education in Rwanda and Ghana to integrate play-based methods into classrooms and curriculum delivery. We also introduced a new partnership with the LEGO Foundation and BRAC that will see us leverage our experiences in these contexts and support the ministry of education in Sierra Leone to integrate playful learning in primary classrooms.

73% of girls in Right To Play-supported schools in Ghana improved their grade-appropriate reading fluency, compared to 60% of girls in unsupported schools.



26,239 teachers were trained to offer experiential playbased lessons and create safe, inclusive spaces for students.



In 15 countries, Right To Play-trained teachers and coaches filled classrooms and play spaces with energy and positivity, and gave children a reason and a way to fight against adversity and hold on to hope. Junior Leaders stood up against injustice and supported their peers to do the same. Girls claimed their rights to stay in school and in the game. And we shared our resources far and wide so more children and youth can be empowered through play.

THE P.O.W.E.R OF PLAY

Open-access digital resources can empower more teachers, coaches, parents, and caregivers with tools to help children develop the life skills they need to thrive in today's world. The Play Opportunities for Wellness and Education Resource (POWER) games video collection, released in 2021 with the support of the LEGO Foundation, makes more than a hundred Right To Play games freely available in English, French, and Arabic for the first time, for use at home and in school. The games empower educators and caregivers to teach children everything from managing their emotions and resolving conflicts to building trust and improving their self-esteem.

INCREASING GENDER EQUALITY IN SPORT

Gender-based violence and discrimination prevents girls in Senegal from claiming their rights or finishing their education. We are empowering Senegalese girls to become changemakers who can challenge the forces that are trying to limit their futures through the RECAF-Jeu project, funded by Global Affairs Canada. The program will use sport and play to help girls build their confidence, learn about their rights and address rights violations, and sensitize parents, caregivers, and other adults to the importance of gender equality. The project will also encourage positive masculinities amongst boys and provide girls with sports opportunities where they can develop their abilities and agency in safe, supportive spaces.

MORE THAN WINNING:

Physical education can encourage gender stereotypes if it's not taught properly. In the Palestinian Territories, girls are encouraged to skip PE class, while boys are sorted into sports teams and told to focus on winning. Haitham is a physical education teacher and coach who is challenging these norms and empowering girls to participate. He's using physical education classes and after-school sports programs to create positive, supportive environments for all children. He helps boys understand that sports aren't just about winning but about selfimprovement, and he's been encouraging girls' participation in sports activities they are normally discouraged from. Haitham believes that every child can reach their potential when they have the right support. READ MORE >



POWER OF OUR DUTCH PARTNERSHIPS =



Right To Play is joined in the Netherlands by a range of corporates, organizations and foundations dedicated to ongoing investment and involvement to help us empower children growing up in the world's most challenging places.

Postcode Lottery

With support of participants in the Dutch Postcode Lottery, thousands of children can participate in our programs every year. We received additional funding for the Power of Play project, which we finalized in 2021. We trained 255 teachers at 114 schools in our play-based learning methodology and strengthened the life skills of more than 21.000 children in Rwanda and the Netherlands. The Rwandan Ministry of Education noticed the positive impact the program had on children's development and decided to integrate play-based learning into the national curriculum.

The Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs

The Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs is a long-term partner of Right To Play. In 2021 we supported young South Sudanese refugees in Uganda, thousands of primary school children in Mali and local communities in Lebanon, as part of the Sport for Development program that Right To Play is implementing with the KNVB, KNHB and ISA in a total of 18 countries with support of the Ministry.

ASICS

With our long term partner ASICS we used sport oriented activities to help children and youth to develop their physical, mental and emotional health in a refugee context and in areas where children grow up in extreme poverty, such as in Burundi, Ethiopia, or Mozambique. ASICS also included Right To Play in several awareness and fundraising initiatives.





The Timeless Foundation

Thanks to The Timeless Foundation we were able to support marginalized children (girls especially) and their parents in Mozambique. We did so by reducing barriers that keep children out of school and by training their parents on how to become more selfsufficient through business principles.

Turing Foundation

With the support of the Turing Foundation we improved the quality of primary school education in Mali. The Foundation contributed to a larger project that reached a total of almost 70,000 children in 2021, trained 1200 in service teachers and almost 500 preservice teachers.





PLAY POWER OF OUR DUTCH PARTNERSHIPS

Many individuals supported Right To Play in 2021. They attended one of our events, participated in a sponsor run; organized a campaign for Right To Play or raised awareness about the challenging issues children face in our programs in Africa, Asia and the Middle East and the power of play based learning.

Running the Dam tot Damloop

Right To Play is since 2013 the official charity of one of the largest run events in the Netherlands: the Dam tot Damloop! We have been teaming up with the event organizer Le Champion for many years, both believing in the power of sport and play. Le Champion made sure many runners would support Right To Play by including a special donation button at the online registration page and every year we have many participants running 10 miles from Amsterdam to Zaandam for team Right To Play. Unfortunately, in 2021 the Damloop had to be canceled due to another Covidpeak, but the donations that already came in were not canceled. On the contrary, with the amount we received, we were able to support many children.



The RAGweek

The RAGweek is an annual event in which students raise funds for a charity of their choice. In 2021 Right To Play was the lucky organisation to receive funding from several student associations active in the Dutch city of Nijmegen. They organized all kinds of online activities as live events were, due to the lockdown, not possible. The students impressed us a lot with their online creativity and surprised us even more with the amount they were able to raise for Right To Play. Well done.



The Ultimate Sports Quiz

After a two-year break due to COVID-19 we were able to organize our annual Ultimate Sports Quiz again to raise funds for Right To Play. With 28 participating teams, 45 challenging questions, 2 top hosts, 4 winners and a great dream team of 7 top athletes, this live event was a success. The atmosphere was relaxed while we were also able to raise awareness for a serious topic: saving a seat in school for girls who are at risk of dropping out and never returning to school after the worldwide lockdowns. With the proceeds of the Sports Quiz we were able to support 3.200 girls.


Field hockey clubs playing for Right To Play

In 2021 three popular Dutch field hockey clubs: KZ (The Hague), Pinoké (Amsterdam) and Schaerweijde (Zeist) made a difference in many different ways for children participating in our programs. Through various events at the clubs they raised awareness for the importance of sport and play for children growing up in in some of the most difficult places on earth. On top of that, the clubs created visibility for Right To Play through brandend hockeymaterials and banners on the hockeyfield. And they also organized special sport activities for the clubs' youth asking the hockey moms and dads for a donation to Right To Play. Next to the cooperation with the clubs, we teamed up with some Hockey retail partners such as Fika gear, Hockey district and Sporttarget who donated a % of purchases made by their clients to Right To Play.



Right To Play Podcast

As the popularity of Podcasts is growing all around the world, we introduced our very own Right To Play Podcast series in the Netherlands. In a series of 15-minute podcasts, our Athlete Ambassador en sports journalist Rivkah op het Veld reflects with fellow ambassadors on topics that have an impact on the lives of vulnerable children, but also on their own world. In the first three episodes, Rivkah talks to power lady and top hockey player Eva de Goede about equal rights for girls; about the refugee crisis with TV Chef Hugo Kennis and the importance of education with Singer Songwriter Diggy Dex.
